About Gender Responsive Agriculture Systems Policy (GRASP) Fellowship

The Gender Responsive Agriculture Systems Policy (GRASP) Fellowship is a career development program that targets mid-career African women in the policy field to catalyze the design and implementation of gender-responsive agricultural policies across Africa.

Funded by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), the Fellowship is implemented by African Women in Agricultural Research and Development (AWARD).

The inaugural cohort of the GRASP Fellowship comprises 48 Policy Fellows from six countries, including Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Nigeria, Uganda and Zambia, drawn from 42 diverse organizations, including the private sector, non-governmental organizations, and government agencies.

As a Knowledge Management, Communications, and Policy Advisor at the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), Vera supports initiatives to improve smallholder farmers' food security and incomes, especially women. In addition, she recently conceptualized and facilitated the launch of the Nigeria Agriculture Gender Network for knowledge sharing and policy advocacy. Vera plans to continue building on her previous knowledge and experience, particularly so she can work with the government to reduce the financial credit barriers many women farmers face.
