Susan Nansereko 2022 AWARD Policy Fellow

"Many of us from different countries share experiences. I look forward to learning what others have done to solve different challenges in their respective countries."

Like many students in Uganda, Susan Nansereko's path into higher education was dictated by a combination of grades and her guardians' wishes. "I was advised by my guardians to study medicine," she admits. However, after receiving her grades in physics, chemistry, biology, and subsidiary mathematics, that plan "did not work out because of my grades."

To secure a place at Makerere University, the most promising alternative option was to study agriculture on a newly launched Community Forestry Course – which, she reveals, "was not what I originally wanted." However, by the time she graduated in 2004, Susan's feelings were wholly different. "I never minded studying agriculture, and I do not regret that I did not study medicine," she says. In fact, she went on to obtain two Master's degrees: one in Environmental Forestry from Bangor University in 2009 and a second in Agricultural Development from the University of Copenhagen in 2010. She is currently studying for a PhD in Plant Breeding and Biotechnology at Makerere University.

After her bachelor's degree, Susan first served as a volunteer for about three years at the National Forestry Resources Research Institute (NaFORRI) before securing a job with the National Forestry Authority (NFA) where she served as a Forest Supervisor overseeing the Lake Victoria Shore Range forests in Masaka District. Susan rejoined NaFORRI in 2008 as a Research Technician and was later promoted to Research Officer.

Despite her extensive experience in forestry research, Susan explains that she doesn't have much experience in the policy arena – primarily because this is not an area Susan has had many opportunities to explore. At NaFORRI, Susan has seen different programs start and end – some of which, she recalls, have had themes to do with policy. However, a lack of policy





expertise among the program teams has meant that related successes have been minimal.

Susan has kept track of the AWARD Fellowships through its newsletter and website since 2012. Although she had been unsuccessful in previous applications, Susan was finally accepted onto the AWARD GRASP Fellowship in 2022. Through the GRASP Fellowship, Susan hopes to strengthen her research on gender advocacy, where she intends to improve the flow of information about gender to key policy influencers in agricultural value chains in Uganda.

"The knowledge, exposure, and the network of other Fellows – seeing that someone else is experiencing the same challenges – is a form of motivation," she affirms. "Many of us from different countries share lessons and experiences. I expect that some of the challenges faced in the Ugandan agricultural sector could have been previously solved elsewhere – so I look forward to learning what other Fellows have done to solve different challenges in their respective countries."

In addition to learning from other Fellows, Susan also believes that the knowledge and guidance imparted by GRASP trainers and mentors will be invaluable. "When I don't understand, I will seek clarification. As a mentee, I will learn from those who are already there and know how to deal with different situations," she states.

GRASP Fellowship is a career development program growing a pool of confident, capable, African women to lead the design and implementation of gender-responsive policies in Africa.
